Speakers to Focus on Writing for Web

hether via commercial Web sites, intranets, online help, or

Web-based training, communicating effectively is one of our biggest challenges. For instance, did you know that 79% of users scan information online instead of reading it word for word, or that online content should have 50% of the word count of its paper equivalent?

To address these kinds of constraints, writers need to understand and apply specific online information principles and techniques. The presenters at the September 13 meeting will discuss what it takes to write effectively for hypermedia. Specifically, they'll talk about how to:

- Adjust your writing style from linear to modular
- Group and nest information so that your reader doesn't get "lost in hyperspace"
- Structure information for quick access
- Layer information for different user levels
- Label information for easy access
- Say more with fewer words in less space
- Use white space and graphics effectively

They'll also show examples of good and bad hypertext, and the audience will be invited to actively participate in explaining what is good and bad about each example.

The speakers, Anne Marie Smith and Caroline Drakeley, are principal owners of InfoPros, a technical communication agency and staffing firm located in Sacramento. Smith has been in the technical communication field since 1984. Drakeley has extensive experience in the publishing, marketing and technical communication arenas. Drakeley and Smith are also instructors in the California State University (CSU), Sacramento technical writing program, and columnists for *California Computer News*, a Northern California technology publication. They are frequent speakers at both national and local conferences in the area of online information. InfoPros was listed as Sacramento's 5th-fastest growing company in 1999 according to the *Sacramento Business Journal*.



STC-BERKELEY MEETING LOCATION AND DIRECTIONS

By BART: Exit the Berkeley station (Richmond line) at Center and proceed north six blocks up Shattuck Ave. to 1600 Shattuck at Cedar.

From north of Berkeley: From I-80, take the University Avenue exit. Go east (towards UCal) to Shattuck Ave. Turn left (north) on Shattuck and go seven blocks to 1600 Shattuck. Turn left on Cedar for parking.

From south of Berkeley: Take I-880 north from San Jose through Oakland. Follow the highway as it curves sharply to the right (where traffic merges) and becomes I-980. Continue on I-980 to Highway 24 (toward Berkeley/Walnut Creek). Take the first exit from 24 (Martin Luther King Jr./51st). Turn right on 51st St. and make first left onto Shattuck Ave. Proceed north on Shattuck to downtown Berkeley. Turn left on University Ave., then right again at first light (north) onto Shattuck. Go seven blocks to 1600 Shattuck. Turn left on Cedar for parking.

From San Francisco: Take the Bay Bridge towards Oakland (I-80 East). At the end of the bridge, stay in the left-hand lanes and head towards Berkeley and Sacramento. Proceed two miles and exit onto University Avenue (on the exit ramp, stay in left lane of split). Go east (towards UCal) to Shattuck Ave. Turn left (north) on Shattuck and go seven blocks to 1600 Shattuck. Turn left on Cedar for parking.

From far East Bay: Take Highway 24 west through Caldecott Tunnel, exit Ashby Avenue. West on Ashby to Shattuck Ave. Right on Shattuck to downtown Berkeley. Turn left (west) on University Ave., then right again at first light (north) onto Shattuck for seven blocks to 1600 Shattuck. Turn left on Cedar for parking.
